










### How did we build the plan?


- **1. Establish the facts**: More than 13,000 Portland youth and adults completed surveys and more than 2,500 Portlanders attended workshops.
- 2. Based on those facts, Portlanders **Set goals**. About 8,000 Portlanders attended workshops or filled in surveys.
- **3. Find actions** to address the issues that Portlanders said matter most: equity, jobs, education and a healthy environment. National experts came to town and shared their ideas and experience with Portlanders at community discussions.






# Local carbon emissions have declined ahead of the national trend






# Population and jobs have increased while carbon emissions have fallen

#### About the Map App

The Map App visualizes the detail and location of the Comprehensive Plan Update Project proposals. With this website you can explore and provide feedback on these proposals in relation to where you live and work.

Current proposals:

- Land Use
- Citywide Systems Plan (CSP)
- Transportation System Plan (TSP)
- Employment Zoning
- Mixed Use Zones
- · Residential & Open Space

Each proposal moves through the legislative process at its own pace, so you'll see this graphic representing where a proposal is in that process throughout the website:



Ex. This proposal is now accepting comments on the <u>Discussion Draft</u>. Comment period is open until (date) and comments are accepted via email, U.S. Mail or through the Map App.

This graphic very simply illustrates the major phases a proposal will go through on its way to adoption, and highlights where it is currently. On the release of each draft, the public is encouraged to comment. The major phases:

- Discussion draft (DD) This is the initial proposal by city staff.
- Proposed draft (PD) A revised draft incorporating feedback received from the public and to be presented to Planning and Sustainability Commission (PSC) for review.
- $\bullet$  Recommended draft (REC) PSC recommended draft to City Council.
- Adopted (A) Final document adopted by City Council.



#### TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM PLAN (TSP)

The TSP is the City's long-range plan to guide transportation investments in Portland. The TSP update will also ensure that Portland is aligned with Metro's Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). The TSP meets state and regional planning requirements and addresses local transportation needs for cost-effective pedestrian, bicycle, transit, freight, and street improvements. The plan will refine the list of major transportation projects, update the street classifications and propose changes to city code to implement the new Comprehensive Plan.




The Recommended Plan will be reviewed by City Council, which will hold public hearings during the fall and winter 2015.

#### GENERALLY, THE MOST LIKELY USES FOR THIS ZONE ARE:
